Student Orientation & Beginning Steps



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This presentation explains:

- why the School of Education requires Chalk & Wire;
- how students will use Chalk & Wire during their education programs; and
- other additional benefits for students using Chalk & Wire.



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Beginning in the academic year 2009-2010, the School of Education (SOE) adopted Chalk & Wire as its assessment and data collection system.



SOE Policy Statement (8/16/10):

- All Undergraduate students admitted during the Fall of 2009 and after, are required to purchase Chalk & Wire.
- All Graduate students admitted in the Fall of 2010 and after are required to purchase Chalk & Wire. Graduate students admitted to the School of Education prior to Fall 2010 must verify the status of Chalk & Wire utilization in their program of study with course instructors. If the program/course requires Chalk & Wire, then the student is required to purchase a license.
 - NOTE: Students enrolled in a course in which Chalk & Wire is listed as a required Course Material are required to purchase a license, regardless of the date they were accepted into the School of Education.

Most schools and colleges of education in the US **require** some sort of exit portfolio from students.

- Traditionally, students present their portfolios in 4-inch, 3-ring binders, stuffed with documents.
- Often these are static documents, created solely for the purpose of meeting graduation requirements.
- They take up a lot of space.



According to the president of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE), colleges of education need to “collect data on teacher candidate performance in relation to P-12 student learning. **Knowledge of content, pedagogy, and content pedagogy is necessary but not sufficient**” (Cibulka, 2009, p. 1, emphasis added).



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As part of US Department of Education initiatives, state licensing regulations have changed from credit-based systems to **assessment of candidates' knowledge and skills** (Cibulka, 2009, emphasis added).



College of education curricula must address the needs of “***digital age learners***—including candidates, experienced teachers, and P-12 students” (Cibulka, 2009, p. 3, emphasis added).

For these reasons, the School of Education adopted Chalk & Wire.

With Chalk & Wire, students can:

- Build electronic portfolios designed around pre-defined program requirements already linked to standards and assessment instruments.
- Upload large video and audio files using Chalk & Wire's streaming technology that automatically compresses and converts video and audio into easily accessible media.



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- Create as many personal ePortfolios as they want.
- Share links to any or all of their ePortfolios with anyone they choose.
- Use the **unlimited storage** space which is included with the license—at no additional charge.



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- Within each undergraduate and graduate program, SOE faculty have designated courses that represent the core of the program.
- Each designated course will have one common assignment that provides opportunities for students to demonstrate mastery of core concepts.
- Each student who takes a designated course, regardless of location, will complete the common assignment. Upon completion of that assignment, students will upload it to Chalk & Wire for assessment.

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- Faculty and assessors can easily evaluate students' submitted work and provide valuable feedback.
- Administrators can easily create reports incorporating a wide variety of contexts and demographics. These reports are typically utilized for internal strategic goal setting, accreditation reports, and research.



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- The Chalk & Wire license is valid and available for 5 years from the date of purchase, which will enable the owner to keep professional portfolios updated.
- Students may elect to renew their licenses (directly through C&W) at the end of the five years OR they can download their artifacts, portfolios, and results to their personal computers.
