Statement from President Fries



Now in its 119th year, New Mexico Highlands University is an incredibly rich multicultural mix of people (75 percent Hispanic, Native American, and African American student enrollment), all learning from one another. A vibrant, mid-sized public university, NMHU is using its dynamic environment, advanced technology, and commitment to individual worth as a force for student learning and regional development. Since 1893, Highlands has served as northern New Mexico's university and, in addition to its main campus in Las Vegas, currently has centers in Farmington, Española/Santa Fe, Raton, Rio Rancho, Albuquerque, and Roswell. Students across New Mexico are able to access several programs online.

New Mexico Highlands intends to expand its historic role as a catalyst for educational excellence and economic growth throughout northern New Mexico via collaboration as appropriate with the school districts and communities in its service region. The University will also strengthen its ties with the distinctive Hispanic and Native American traditions of the region.

Recognizing that it is the students, faculty, and staff who are at the heart of the university's reputation and ability to fulfill its mission, the university strives to provide a work and learning environment that fosters integrity, respect, tolerance, fairness, quality, equity, and accountability. 



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
Four-Year Enrollment Main Campus Undergraduate Students



Four-Year Enrollment Main Campus Graduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Rio Rancho Center Undergraduate Students








Four-Year Enrollment Farmington Center Undergraduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Farmington Center Graduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Santa Fe Center Undergraduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Santa Fe Center Graduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Raton Center Undergraduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Raton Center Graduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Albuquerque Center Undergraduate & Graduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Roswell Center Graduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment DE/Off-Campus Undergraduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment DE/Off-Campus Graduate Students



Total Fall Enrollment – 1914 - 2012






Comparative Enrollments for Main Campus and Centers





Percent of Full-Time, First-Time Freshmen Retained to Second Fall Semester













Information Technology

Information Technology Services (ITS) manages New Mexico Highlands University's computing, communications, and other information technology resources. The department works with all members of the campus community to provide guidance, management, and expertise regarding technology plans and strategies designed to support the mission and goals of the university. The highly integrated campus technology environment provides voice over IP, video, and data to classrooms, offices, and residence halls. The staff of ITS works to keep up with rapidly changing applications and technologies to provide faculty, staff and students with the services, tools and technologies needed to compete and succeed in a learning environment. Highlands continues to expand its web-based, public and private cloud services, specifically online learning management systems and associated applications. Enhanced e-mail services, and self-service functionality via the university's administrative software applications are also available to students, faculty, staff and administration.
