room, open a classroom window that was stuck on the day a conference or presentation was booked on campus, have a new key made, or reserve a fleet vehicle for an important trip, consider the dedicated staff behind the Facilities Department who make everyday amenities possible.

The NMHU Facilities Services Department serves a significant population of students, faculty, staff, visitors, community members, and passerbys seeking services daily. Students are the focal point of everything the department does, so it is our mission to improve the campus for all who work, learn, visit, live, and play here. Despite a modest budget and staff of approximately 80 people, the department serves all with disabilities and non-disabilities by maintaining:

- over forty-five edifices on campus (totaling over 1.2 million gross square feet of building space), grounds, landscapes, roads, walkways, steps, parks, infrastructure, parking lots, etc. within one hundred plus acres. Among the many roles the department plays (providing 24/7/365 support to auxiliaries, safety, and loss prevention), it is also responsible for the fiscal and daily management of:
- the university's fleet (i.e., vehicle reservations, repairs, maintenance, fuel, cost management);
- electrical, mechanical/plumbing, auto mechanic, grounds/landscaping, custodial, locksmith, paint, and carpentry trades;
- a warehouse that transacts substantial consumable inventories daily;
- all Capital Outlay projects (i.e., renovation and construction);
- campus-wide setups and special events;
- all building/property deferred maintenance, renewal, and replacement, to include the Rio Rancho and Raton Centers:
- a majority of the university's utilities; and
- a community recycling center.

This month is going to be particularly busy for the department. With winter nearing, our crews are busy weatherizing buildings and testing equipment, plumbing, electrical, and mechanical systems. Work orders are increasingly being generated in preparation for the colder weather. Despite daily operations, the department is at the center of scheduling the demolition of the "green house" west of the Viles & Crimmin Residence Hall, setting up for a jampacked homecoming week, and the university's 120th Anniversary "Birthday Bash," as well as the remodeling of the Margaret Kennedy Lounge for the opening of the Robert Bell Permanent Art Collection. Also, we're involved in the selection of an architectural and engineering firm for the trolley renovation project and are working closely with Molzen-Corbin in the production of the university's Athletic/Intramural/Recreational Master Plan.

NMHU Facilities Services personnel respond to over 3,800 work orders annually, and everyone of our personnel holds an important responsibility in keeping the campus functioning. The department is made up of dedicated people who assist one another in making things happen and are proud to serve; and we believe it shows through the many large and small, public and unforeseen tasks it accomplishes every day.


