Statement from President Fries



New Mexico Highlands University has been northern New Mexico's university since 1893. Including centers and sites in Farmington, Santa Fe, Rio Rancho, Albuquerque, and Roswell, the university serves students from 42 states, 19 tribes, and 36 foreign countries. Additional diversity is reflected in the roughly 73% of students who are either Hispanic, Native American, or African American. This rich mix of people from around the globe represents a campus environment where we all can learn about and from one another on literally a daily basis.

We take pride in thinking about Highlands as a center of Affordable Excellence. With some of the very lowest rates for tuition and fees at any university across the entire country, Highlands is relatively very affordable. As a result, the average student debt for Highlands' graduates is only \$14,083 compared to the \$18,656 average for New Mexico, which is the only state in the country where that figure is under \$20,000.

While with some things in our society, value is associated with higher cost, that isn't applicable in this case. The chance to work with our faculty and the range of experiential opportunities both in and out of the classroom available through research projects, internships, and field experiences is exceptional. Students who apply themselves receive an excellent education and in most cases not only finish with a resume that tells what they studied and can do, but also what they have done. That is important and much harder to achieve at larger universities.

Our faculty and staff are here to challenge and support our students at every level.





Bachelor's vs. Master's Degrees: Fall 2013 - Spring 2014 - Summer 2014




Four-Year Enrollment Main Campus Undergraduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Main Campus Graduate Students



Four-Year Enrollment Rio Rancho Center Undergraduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Rio Rancho Center Graduate Students






Four-Year Enrollment Farmington Center Undergraduate Students



Four-Year Enrollment Farmington Center Graduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment Santa Fe Center Undergraduate Students










Four-Year Enrollment Roswell Center Graduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment DE/Off-Campus Undergraduate Students




Four-Year Enrollment DE/Off-Campus Graduate Students




Comparative Enrollments for Main Campus and Centers





Total Student Enrollment Trends – Fall 1914 - Fall 2014




Percent of Full-Time, First-Time Freshmen Retained to Second Fall Semester


First-time, Full-Time Fall Semester County/State Enrollment Origin

College Incentive Grant: \$1,000 (\$500 per semester) (\$500 per semester) Eligibility: 2.0 - 2.49 HS GPA

Will convert to Lottery Tuition Scholarship second semester with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA first semester. Otherwise, \$500 for second semester and renewable for an additional 7 semesters with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA in the second and subsequent semesters.

Freshman Success Scholarship (3%): \$1,500 (\$1,000 first semester and \$500 second semester) Eligibility: 2.5 – 2.99 HS GPA Will convert to Lottery Tuition Scholarship second semester with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA first semester. Otherwise, \$500 for second semester and renewable for an additional 7 semesters with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA first semester.

Dean's Scholarship (3%): \$2,300 (\$1,650 first semester and \$650 second semester) Eligibility: 3.0 HS GPA Will convert to Lottery Tuition Scholarship plus \$150 book award second semester with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA first semester. Otherwise, \$650 second semester and renewable for an additional 7 semesters at \$650 per semester with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA in second and subsequent semesters.

Presidential Silver Scholarship (3%): \$3,500 (\$2,250 first semester and \$1,250 second semester) Eligibility: 3.5 HS GPA and 22 ACT

Will convert to Lottery Tuition Scholarship plus \$750 housing and book allowance with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA first semester. Otherwise, \$1,250 second semester: renewable for an additional 7 semesters at \$750 per semester with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA in second and subsequent semesters or \$1,250 per semester with completion of 15 credits and 3.0 GPA in second and subsequent semesters.

Presidential Gold Scholarship (3%): \$4,500 (\$2,750 first semester and \$1,750 second semester) Eligibility: 3.75 HS GPA and 25 ACT

Will convert to Lottery Tuition Scholarship plus \$1,250 campus housing, board, and book allowances with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA first semester. Otherwise, \$1,750 second semester, renewable for an additional 7 semesters at \$750 per semester with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 gpa in second and subsequent semesters or \$1,750 per semester with completion of 15 credits and 3.0 GPA in second and subsequent semesters.

Regent's NM Scholars Scholarship (Special Appropriation of \$20,607): **\$5,000** (\$2,500 per semester) Eligibility: Top 5% of class or 25 ACT, family income of \$60,000 or less Will convert to Lottery Tuition Scholarship plus \$1,500 second semester with successful completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA first semester. Otherwise \$2,500 second semester: renewable for an additional 7 semesters at \$800 per semester with completion of 15 credits and 2.5 GPA in second and subsequent semesters or \$2,500 per semester with completion of 15 credits and 3.0 GPA in second and subsequent semesters.

Ken and Sue Crimmins: Tuition and fees plus \$400 book award Eligibility: Lottery eligible graduate of West Las Vegas or Robertson High with 3.0 GPA Renewable for total of 8 semesters of full-time undergraduate studies with completion of 12 credit hours and a 3.0 GPA per semester.







Information Technology Services (ITS) manages New Mexico Highlands University's computing, communications, and other information technology resources. The department works with all members of the campus community to provide guidance, management, and expertise regarding technology plans and strategies designed to support the mission and goals of the University. The highly integrated campus technology environment provides voice over IP, video, and data to classrooms, offices, and residence halls. The staff of ITS works to keep up with rapidly changing applications and technologies to provide faculty, staff and students with the services, tools and technologies needed to compete and succeed in a learning environment. NMHU continues to expand its web-based public and private cloud services, specifically online learning management systems and associated applications. Enhanced e-mail services, and self-service functionality via the Universities administrative software applications are also available to students, faculty, staff and administration.
